Rumor has it that recent policy changes have occurred at this radiology company where trauma related injury films are no longer being read by certain radiologists who are not well liked by insurance companies and their "hired gun" orthopedic physicians to whom the radiology companies are beholden.

## If In An Accident...

When in an auto accident always take an ambulance to the hospital if you want an examination and need care right away. When you take an ambulance you come in the back door of the E.R. If you come in the front door, you may not be seen for hours. It could be up to a five hour wait in a room full of germs and sick people. An urgent care is OK, but at a minimum get checked out within 24 hours. Insurance companies are famous for claiming "you must not have been hurt" if you don't get examined within the first 24 hours. Police officers frequently check the box for "no injury" when you say "no" to an ambulance.

# **Water Savers**

The Glendale community of Paseo Place has taken action towards water conservation. Earlier this month volunteers, HOA officers, and Glendale Water Services Department Staff gathered to announce they are now



Glendale Efficiency Partners and have saved more than 1.3 million gallons. This was done through converting almost half an acre of land to water-wise xeriscape.

Many people in the Phoenix community are taking actions to become more water conscious. If you are seeking ways to reduce your water usage you could first begin with locating your meter. Your water meter is located near the curb in your front yard in a direct line with the main outside faucet. You can remove

the lid with a large screwdriver.

Here is a helpful way to find a water leak. Begin with turning all your water off inside and outside. Then check your water meter in the front yard. If a small red triangle is spinning, then that means water is passing through and you have a leak. Remember to check your outside water drip system to be sure there are no other issues.

Be sure to check with your city for where your responsibility begins when it comes to your water system. In some cities services and maintenance are covered by the city including your water meter. Once water exits the meter, it enters the customer's private property and area of responsibility.
